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
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Skaters vow to save park

Mr Lalama said the skate park on Lewis Road had become a "social hub" since it council would not change its was built in 1989 and catered to people of all skill levels.

He accused the council of getting rid of the "historic" facility without consultation.

The council will begin dismantling the site once the

"He was as fit as a mallee bull," Cr Karin Orpen said.

"He was a lovely bloke." She said he would be missed by the Knox community. "Everybody knew Chris Quinn."

Accepting his award on Australia Day last year, Mr Quinn said migrants had made Australia the special nation it was today.

Mr Quinn migrated from Ireland to Australia in 1949 and moved to Ferntree Gully seven years later.

He was recognised for his contribution to the municipality as one of the area's first greengrocers.

Mr Quinn was an active member of the St John's Catholic Church and St John's Primary School and worked with immigrants through the Irish Welfare Bureau.

Mayor Jim Penna said the council was saddened to hear Mr Quinn had died and extended his condolences on behalf of the council.
