Rally to save skate park draws crowd

SKATERS hosted a barbecue and public rally at the Knox Bowl on Sunday in an effort to convince the council not to scrap the popular skate park.

The fate of the park will become known at a council meeting next Tuesday.

Save Knox Bowl group leader David Lalama said the campaign had gained support with a good turnout at the rally. "The Save Knox Bowl campaign is a

grassroots campaign by skaters, BMX

riders and their families to save an

important facility for young people. "We are using the democratic process to get the council to listen; we hope the council will save the skate park."

Aston MP Chris Pearce showed his support for the cause by attending the rally.

"My focus is on standing up for the people of Aston who want to see this important community facility saved for future generations."

Mr Pearce said Mayor Jim Penna told him it was not a federal parliamentarian's role to represent his constituents on the issue.

Cr Penna refused to respond to Mr Pearce's letter requesting the council's original reasons for closing the skate park.

"It's rubbish and he knows it's rubbish ... he's just trying to take credit for any reconsideration the council might make," he said.

Cr Penna would not say whether the council was planning to change its decision to decommission Knox Bowl.

"You would be aware that a petition was presented to the council and we're going to respond to that at our next meeting.

"What I said to him [Mr Pearce] was we are not directly accountable to him."

Stamford facelift closer

ROWVILLE'S historic Stamford House is a step closer to being redeveloped after Knox Council finalised the sale of adjoining land to a property group for \$2.4 million.


Last week, Knox Council revealed it sold 4.8 hectares near Stud Road to St Hilliers
