Put on your helmet or pay up!

BMX riders could be stung with \$55 fines for repeatedly not wearing helmets in skate parks.

While police are vowing to crack down on those riding without helmets, a veteran BMX rider says it's unnecessary to force experienced riders to wear full safety equipment. The *Leader* recently photographed several BMX riders including Dave McComb (pictured) performing tricks without helmets at

the Lewis Park skate bowl in Wantirna.

Rowville Acting Sen-Sgt Wayne McDonald said skate parks were not exempt from normal safety regulations, with police authorised to fine riders without helmets.

"There does seem to be some defiance these days from young people who don't want to wear them – who see it as not being cool," Sen-Sgt McDonald said.

"I've been down to skate parks on weekends for their competitions and they go around pretty fast."

But David Lalama, the organiser of the Save Knox Bowl campaign that forced Knox Council to scrap plans to demolish the Lewis Park site, said most BMX riders knew the risks involved and should be allowed some discretion.

He said the wearing of helmets should only be enforced in skate parks for less experienced riders, nominating 13 and under as a possible age cut-off.

"If police are going to be enforcing that,

they should probably be pushing for helmets to be compulsory in all contact sports and also in skateboarding," Mr Lalama said.

He said helmets should be worn by riders out in public, but not in skate parks.

Sen-Sgt McDonald said unhelmeted riders usually received an informal warning if it was their first offence.

He said fines of \$55 would be meted out to riders who repeatedly put their safety at risk

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
