My heart goes out to IN response to Naomi Nelson's letter to the editor (Knox Leader July 1), I strongly disagree that as mayor and chair of the council meeting I attempted to stifle anyone's right to free speech during public question time. Normal procedures were followed and nobody's opinion or voice was stifled.

Under council's local laws, questioners are allowed two minutes to speak to a question once the question has been put. The chair then responds to the question or directs an officer to provide an answer.
